



Action Plan and Budget Tracking

Key achievements to date until July 2023:

- Inter-school competitions are now running again across at Wales High School. Our children have taken part in athletics, dance, gymnastics. tag rugby, cricket and tennis events.
- Most of our pupils have taken part in intra-school competitions this year, including hockey, football, orienteering, cricket and rounders and these have been extremely successful: the children have enjoyed participating in these and for some, they have developed a passion for those sports
- Sports Day organised for 7th July 2023 Parents and family members are invited.
- Networking with other schools in JMAT SH attended PE meeting to discuss current issues, ways forward and share good practice.
- New curriculum introduced to cover foundation subjects, which includes the element of Dance. This is extremely useful as Dance remains one of our identified areas for improvement and one where CPD may be required next year.
- Children engaged and enjoying their PE lessons.
- SH/RP created a floorbook to showcase our work in PE. This includes pupil voice (speech bubbles), QR codes which take you to view videos of lessons, etc.


Areas for further improvement and baseline evidence of need:

- Establish links with local sports clubs and promote these to our pupils. especially if they show an interest or could progress further.
- More networking with schools in our area link with KPI, WHS and other agencies – Rotherham United?
- Possibly set up a school football team and take part in a local school football league.
- Develop further, and improve, the sports games and activities programme for lunchtimes and breaktimes. Ensure that more children are keeping active for longer periods of time.
- Work on the PE assessment programme with Dan Bennett, Explore the 'hand, head, heart' system, which would link well with our school games values and our school values.
- Raise the profile of school sport/PE using ClassDojo, Twitter, our website. etc.
- Promote our school game values (passion, self-belief, respect, honesty. determination and teamwork) more in lessons and praise the children when they are showing them. Hand out certificates to 'sports stars' at the end of every half term.
- Ensure that intra-school competitions happen at the end of every half term unit of work.


